Reserve Bank of India (RBI) sought comments on Draft Framework for Self-Regulatory Organisations (SROs)

- ▶ With **growth of Regulated Entities**, their operational scale, **increased adoption of innovative technologies** has necessitated the **development of better industry standards for self-regulation**.
 - ⊕ Draft titled '**Omnibus Framework for recognising SROs for its Regulated Entities**' contains objectives, functions, eligibility criteria, etc., which will be **common for all SRO**.
- ▶ SRO is a **non-governmental organization** that represents a particular sector/industry and sets and enforces rules and standards relating to conduct of its member entities. **E.g. Financial Industry Regulatory Authority**.
- ▶ **Eligibility criteria:** Entities intending to function as an SRO shall be set up as a not-for-profit company registered under Section 8 of Companies Act, 2013.
- ▶ **Characteristics of SRO**
 - ⊕ SRO should have **strong governance mechanisms**, including **focus on independent board, transparency**, and adherence to well-defined processes.
 - ⊕ **Develop standards for improving compliance culture and adherence by its members** to rules and regulations framed by RBI.
 - ⊕ Devise and implement **standardised procedures for handling disputes** among members.
- ▶ **Objectives of SRO**
 - ⊕ **Promote a culture of compliance** among its members by promoting progressive practices.
 - ⊕ Act as **collective voice of members** and address broader industry concerns.
 - ⊕ **Collect and share relevant sectoral information** to aid RBI in policymaking.
 - ⊕ Encourage a **culture of research and development** within sector.



5 years of Information Fusion Centre for Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR)

- ▶ IFC-IOR, **hosted by Indian Navy**, was established by Government of India at **Information Management and Analysis Centre, Gurugram** in 2018.
 - ⊕ To enable better correlation, compressed information cycles and timely inputs, IFC-IOR hosts **International Liaison Officers from 12 partner nations**.
- ▶ **Significance of IFC-IOR**
 - ⊕ **Enhance maritime safety and security** in IOR in line with **India's vision of Security and Growth for All in the Region (SAGAR)**.
 - ⊕ Enables participating countries to better **track illegal activities, identify potential threats, and coordinate responses**.
 - ⊕ **Combat major concerns like terrorism, human trafficking etc.** in Indian Ocean.
- ▶ **Why IOR is Important for India?**
 - ⊕ **Economic Significance:** **95% of India's trade** by volume and **68% of trade by value** is moved through sea via Indian Ocean.
 - ⊕ **Food Security:** About **250 million people live within 50 Km of coast** and dependent on sea for food and livelihood.
 - ⊕ **Strategic Importance:** Central position of India in IOR makes it a natural maritime power, influencing sea lanes and regional dynamics.
 - ⊕ **Resource Exploration:** The **world's third-largest ocean** holds abundant mineral resources like gold, tin, uranium, cobalt, nickel etc.

Concerns associated with IOR

- ▶ **Climate change** and rising sea levels; **transnational crimes** (piracy, drug and arms trafficking); **illegal fishing**, etc. can **disrupt trade supply chains** and undermine the region's economic growth.

Nicaragua Bound Plane with Indian passengers held in France over Suspected Human Trafficking Returned to India

- This incident has led to investigation on a potential **organized crime related activities** aiding alleged **human trafficking scam**.
 - ⊕ Involvement of **organized criminal groups in human trafficking** and their **transnational nature** makes it challenging to tackle.
- **Human trafficking** is an act of recruitment, transport, harbouring or receipt of a person by means of coercion, abduction, fraud or deception.
 - ⊕ **Human trafficking has many forms**. These include exploitation in the sex, entertainment and hospitality industries, and as domestic workers or in forced marriages.
 - ⊕ **2022 Global Report on Trafficking in Persons** shows that in 2020 about **50,000 human trafficking victims** were detected and reported by 141 countries.
- **Role of Transnational Organised Crime Groups in Human Trafficking**
 - ⊕ **Global Networks**: Transnational organized crime groups have extensive global networks that facilitate human trafficking.
 - ⊕ **Logistical Expertise**: Organized crime groups bring a **high level of logistical expertise** to human trafficking operations.
 - ⊕ **Corruption and Bribery**: They may corrupt officials at various levels, including law enforcement, immigration, and border control, to ensure the smooth movement of trafficked individuals.
 - ⊕ **Money Laundering**: Profits generated from human trafficking are often laundered through legitimate businesses.

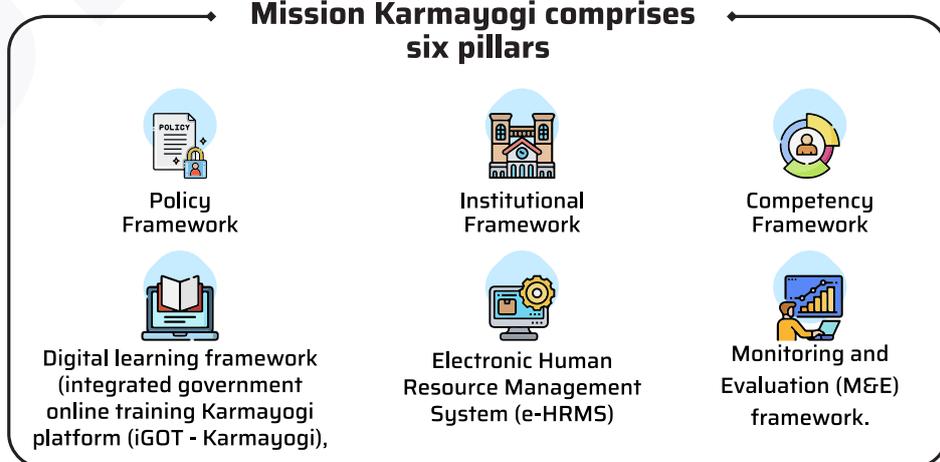
Measures Taken to Combat Human Trafficking

- **At Global level :**
 - ⊕ **UN Convention against Transnational Organised Crime (UNTOC)** supplemented by **Protocol against the Smuggling of Migrants by Land, Sea and Air**. (Ratified by India)
 - ⊕ **SAARC Convention** on Preventing and Combating Trafficking in Women and Children for Prostitution
- **In India:**
 - ⊕ **Article 23 of the Constitution** prohibits trafficking in human beings.
 - ⊕ **Immoral Traffic Prevention Act, 1956** addresses Trafficking.

On Good Governance Day, Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pensions launched Extended Version of Mission Karmayogi

- **Mission Karmayogi (National Programme for Civil Services Capacity Building)** aims at building a **future-ready civil service** with **right attitude** (innovative, professional, etc.), **skills** (technology enabled) and **knowledge** aligned to the vision of New India.
- **New features launched on Mission Karmayogi platform**
 - ⊕ **My iGOT**: Delivers **targeted training courses** of individual officer.
 - ⊕ **Blended Programs**: Facilitate **equitable access** to training methodologies across all levels and **integrates offline classroom courses** with **online learning** components.
 - ⊕ **VIKAS (Variable & Immersive Karmayogi Advanced Support)**: New blended learning programme for management of civil servants in Central Secretariat.
 - ⊕ **Curated Programs**: Cater diverse learning needs of Ministries/Departments and Training Institutions.
 - ⊕ **12 domain specific capacity building e-learning courses** have been developed.
- **Significance of Mission Karmayogi**
 - ⊕ Focuses on development of **functional, behavioural and technological competencies** for New India.
 - ⊕ Support transition from **Rules to Roles based HR management system**.
 - ⊕ **Lifelong learning** and personalized learning paths.
 - ⊕ Emphasize on '**on-site learning**' to complement 'off-site' learning.

Good Governance Day

- Since 2014, it is celebrated on **25th December** in honour of former Prime Minister Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee to **promote citizen-centric, efficient and transparent governance** and **improve service delivery**.

National Financial Reporting Authority (NFRA) Found Deficiencies in Audit Quality of Big Four Audit Firms

- NFRA as a regulator oversees accounting standards and auditing profession in India.
 - ⊖ NFRA is a statutory body constituted in 2018 under Section 132 of the Companies Act, 2013.
 - ⊖ Act mandates NFRA to monitor compliance with Auditing Standards and to oversee the quality of service of the professions associated.
 - ⊖ Under this mandate, NFRA initiated audit quality inspections in big four audit firms.
 - ◆ Namely Deloitte, Haskins & Sells LLP; BSR & Co LLP; SRBC & Co LLP; and Price Waterhouse Chartered Accountants LLP.
- Key Issues Highlighted
 - ⊖ Independence Issues: Firms are not in full compliance with the independence related requirements of the Code of Ethics.
 - ⊖ Quality of Audit Documentation: Deficiencies in documentation can lead to challenges in justifying audit conclusions and procedures.
 - ⊖ Inadequate Risk Assessment: Concerns raised about effectiveness of internal risk management processes within organization.
 - ⊖ Regulatory Compliance Issues: Violations of Companies Act 2013 seen in policies of SRBC & Co.
 - ◆ It did not fully recognize the relationships between SRBC and its network members.

“State of the Judiciary: A report on Infrastructure, Budgeting, Human Resources and ICT” Released by Supreme Court (SC)

- Report studies present state of India’s justice delivery efforts, with a focus on the High Courts (HCs) and district judiciary. Report is structured in four Parts.
- Human Resource Management
 - ⊖ Vacancies: There is a vacancy of 347 judges (31%) in the HCs and of 5,300 judges (21%) in district judiciary.
 - ⊖ Women in Judiciary: Women constitute 36.3 % of working strength of district judiciary.
 - ◆ SC had only 3 women judges and 103 female judges (13.42 %) in HCs across India (October 2023).
- Judicial Infrastructure
 - ⊖ Court Rooms: Shortage of 134 courtrooms in HCs and of 4,250 courtrooms in the district judiciary.
 - ⊖ Sanitation Facilities: 19.7% of the District Courts in India do not have separate toilets for females.
- Budgeting for the District Judiciary
 - ⊖ Stringent conditions: Many States face difficulties in getting funds due to stringent conditionality such as mandatory furnishing Utilisation Certificate.
 - ⊖ Lack of Coordination: Lack of single ownership due to which coordination between the agencies is hampered.
- Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Enablement of Judiciary
 - ⊖ Slow Pace of Digitization: Only 48.6% of District Court complexes have a functional e-filing facility.

Recommendations by Report

- A dedicated land bank for fast track infrastructural projects.
- Need for a body at the Central level to ensure better coordination, monitoring and effective budget utilisation.
- A standard time frame to conduct timely recruitment of support staff in the district judiciary.
- A permanent IT Cadre in the district judiciary and regular training of judges, lawyers etc. to strengthen capacity building.

World’s oldest-known Fort Discovered

- An international team of archaeologists has uncovered what is believed to be the world’s oldest-known fort in a remote region of Siberia.
- The fortified settlement, named Amnya, is located along the Amnya River in western Siberia.
- Radiocarbon dating of samples collected at the site places the fort’s construction around 8,000 years ago.
- The ground breaking discovery challenges conventional beliefs about early human societies.
 - ⊖ It is suggesting that complex defence structures existed among hunter-gatherers much earlier than previously thought.



Pong Dam Wildlife Sanctuary (PDWS)

- Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change issued draft notification declaring one-kilometre area around PDWS as an Eco-Sensitive Zone, where commercial activities will not be allowed.
- About Pong Dam Wildlife Sanctuary
 - ⊖ Located in Kangra district, Himachal Pradesh.
 - ⊖ Pong Dam Lake (Maharana Pratap Sagar) is a manmade reservoir created in 1975 with construction of Pong Dam on Beas River. It is also known as Pong reservoir or Pong Dam.
 - ◆ In 1983, reservoir was declared as Wildlife Sanctuary.
 - ◆ Pong Dam Lake was designated a Ramsar site in 2002.
 - ⊖ There is a Vulture café in Pong wherein cattle carcass is dumped for Vultures.
 - ⊖ Fauna: Leopard, Sambher, Wild Boar, Porcupine etc.



Card-on-File Tokenisation (CoFT)

- **RBI has enabled CoFT directly through card issuing banks.**
 - ⊕ This will provide **cardholders** with **additional choice to tokenize their cards** for **multiple merchant sites** through a single process.
- **CoFT**
 - ⊕ **Tokenisation** refers to replacement of **actual credit and debit card details** with an **alternate code** called the **token**.
 - ◆ This **token is unique** for a specific combination of **card, token requestor, and device**.
 - ⊕ **Card details** when stored with a merchant are known as **Card-on-File**.
 - ◆ To avoid any breach or leak of data, RBI introduced **tokenisation**.



AstroSat

- **AstroSat** has detected **bright sub-second X-ray bursts** from a new and unique neutron star with ultrahigh magnetic field (i.e from a **Magnetar**).
 - ⊕ Scientists leveraged **observational powers of AstroSat** to conduct a comprehensive study of the **magnetar SGR J1830-0645**.
 - ⊕ **Magnetars are neutron stars** having an ultrahigh magnetic field that are much stronger than the **magnetic field of Earth**.
- **Astrosat**
 - ⊕ India's first **multi-wavelength space-based observatory**.
 - ⊕ Launched by the **Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO)** in 2015.



MedTech Mitra

- **Ministry of Health and Family Welfare** have launched '**MedTech Mitra**': A Strategic Initiative to Empower MedTech Innovators and Advance Healthcare Solutions.
- **MedTech Mitra** is a platform that will help young talents of country in shaping their research and getting **regulatory approval**.
 - ⊕ It will facilitate **indigenous development of affordable, quality MedTech devices and diagnostics** leading to **reduction in import dependence** (presently around 80%) in MedTech.
- **Other initiatives for MedTech sector:** Production linked incentive schemes and investments for medical drug parks, MedTech research policy and MedTech research incentive scheme.



Dengue

- **World Health Organization (WHO)** has reported more than **five million dengue infections** and 5,000 deaths from Dengue in 2023.
 - ⊕ **India**, along with Indonesia, Myanmar, Sri Lanka and Thailand rank among the **world's 30 most highly endemic countries**.
- **Dengue virus is transmitted to humans** through **bite of infected mosquitoes (Aedes Aegypti)**.
 - ⊕ Found in **tropical and sub-tropical climates** worldwide, mostly in **urban and semi-urban areas**.
 - ⊕ Factors for dengue spread: **Changing distribution of mosquitoes** owing to 2023 El Nino phenomena and **climate change** leading to **increasing temperatures and high rainfall**.
 - ⊕ There is **no specific treatment** for dengue.



Endosulfan

- National Green Tribunal has issued notice to **Union Government, Karnataka and Kerala governments** on **dumping endosulfan in hilly area of Minchinpadavu** in Kasaragod district of Kerala.
- Endosulfan is an **Organochlorine Pesticide** used to **control variety of insects and mites on wide range of crops** including soy, rice, wheat, vegetables, fruits, nuts, coffee, tobacco and cotton.
 - ⊕ It is listed under both **Rotterdam Convention on the Prior Informed Consent** and **Stockholm Convention on Persistent Organic Pollutants**.
- **Harmful effects:** Chronic exposure can lead to **reproductive problems, neurological damage, and cancer**.



T+0 Settlement

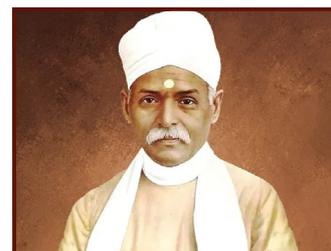
- **SEBI issued a consultation paper** proposing to introduce **same-day settlement (known as T+0)** of trades on stock exchanges and **real time settlement on an optional basis**.
- **T+0 settlement** refers to a financial transaction settlement process that is completed on the same day as the trade date.
 - ⊕ **Earlier in 2021, T+1 settlement** was introduced which was fully implemented from January 2023.
- **Benefits:**
 - ⊕ Eliminates the risk of **settlement shortages**.
 - ⊕ Expected to **provide flexibility to clients**.

Personality in News



Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya (25 December 1861 - 12 November 1946)

- PM releases 'Collected Works of Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya' on his birth anniversary.
- **Contributions and Achievements**
 - ⊕ **Started Abhyudaya** (Hindi weekly) in 1907, **Maryada** (Hindi monthly magazine) in 1910 and founded **Leader newspaper** (English Daily) in 1909.
 - ⊕ Served as **President of Indian National Congress** in 1909, 1918, 1932 and 1933.
 - ⊕ Founded **Hindu Mahasabha in 1907** and served as member of Imperial Legislative Council.
 - ⊕ In 1916, he **founded Banaras Hindu University**.
 - ⊕ **Honoured with Bharat Ratna** (posthumously), India's highest civilian honour.
- **Values:** Patriotism, Impartiality, Honesty etc.
