## INTERNATIONAL RHINO FOUNDATION (IRF) RELEASED STATE OF THE RHINO 2023 REPORT

• Founded as International Black Rhino Foundation in 1991, IRF is now **dedicated to survival of all five living rhino** species.

### • Key findings

- **Greater one-horned rhino** (aka Indian rhino) **population** in India and Nepal **continues to grow** due to strong protection, wildlife crime law enforcement and habitat expansion.
- **Black rhino** populations are **increasing** despite constant poaching pressure.
- Population of **white rhinos and sumatran rhinos** are **decreasing**.

### • About Rhino

- There are **five species** of rhino (refer image). Out of them, **three rhino species** are found in **Asia** namely Sumatran rhino, Javan rhino and Indian rhino.
  - Asian rhinos are **excellent swimmers** and can easily swim across rivers.
- Indian rhino is **largest of all rhino species** and commonly found in **India** (Assam, West Bengal and Utter Pradesh), **Nepal, Bhutan, and Pakistan**.
- Indian rhino is protected under **Schedule I of Wildlife Protection Act, 1972**

• **Threat:** Habitat loss, poaching for rhino horn and climate change.

### • Rhino conservation initiatives

- **National Rhino Conservation Strategy 2019** to conserve **Indian rhinoceros**.
- **New Delhi Declaration on Asian Rhinos 2019**.
- **Indian Rhino Vision 2020** is a joint program of **Assam Forest Department, World Wide Fund for Nature – India (WWF-India)** and **IRF** to increase rhinos population.



## DEPARTMENT FOR PROMOTION OF INDUSTRY AND INTERNAL TRADE (DPIIT) RELEASED DRAFT PATENTS (AMENDMENT) RULES 2023

• **Draft rule** is released under **Patents Act of 1970** and **proposes amendments** to **Patents Rules 2003** which form the basis for **patent governance system** in India.

- A patent is a **government-granted right to an inventor**, allowing them **to exclude others** from **making, using, or selling** their invention for a **limited time** in exchange **for disclosing the invention's details**.
- **Granted by:** **Controller General of Patents, Designs and Trade Marks (CGPDTM)** under the **DPIIT** (Ministry of Commerce & Industry).

### • Key Provisions:

- **Fee:** Dynamic **fee will be applicable** on **Pre-Grant Opposition (PGO) filing** which was **free earlier**.
  - PGO is a **pre-grant opposition** filed by **anyone after patent** publication but before its grant.
- **PGO filing** which can be done by anyone, will **now be determined** by CGPDTM.
- **Notice time period:** time period for **applicants to reply to notice on PGO** has been **reduced from 3 to 2 months**.
- **Timeline** for filing **Requests for Examination (precondition to examine the patent,)** is **reduced from 48 to 31 months**.
- **Working Statements (annual statement by patent holders** about his/her patent) is to be submitted **once in 3 years**.
- **Disclosure of patented product's manufacturing location and price** is no longer required.

• **Concerns with Draft rule:** Transparency issues, financial burden on organisations filing PGOs, **creation of monopolies**, Increased prices of medicines etc.



# NASA'S OSIRIS-REx ASTEROID SAMPLES CAPSULE FROM ASTEROID BENNU LANDS ON EARTH

- OSIRIS-REx (**O**rigins, **S**pectral Interpretation, **R**esource Identification, **S**ecurity- **R**egolith Explorer), launched in 2016, is the NASA's first mission to **collect a sample from near-Earth asteroid Bennu**.
  - In 2020, OSIRIS-REx spacecraft collected **samples of dust and pebbles** from asteroid Bennu.
    - Asteroids are **rocky objects that orbit the Sun**. They are the remnants from formation of solar system over 4.6 billion years ago.
    - They are also called **minor planets** as they are much smaller than planets.
- Bennu is a **B-type asteroid**, i.e., it contains **significant amounts of carbon** and various other minerals. Hence, it reflects **about 4% of the light that hits it** (Earth reflects about 30% and Venus reflects about 65 %).
  - Bennu was formed in first 10 million years of solar system's creations.
  - It has not gone through a lot of composition-altering change through billions of years, which means that **below its surface lie chemicals and rocks** from the birth of the solar system.
- **Significance of asteroid samples**
  - To better understand **planet formation** and **origin of organics and water** that led to life on Earth.
  - **Benefit humanity** by learning more about potentially hazardous asteroids.

## OTHER MISSIONS TO BRING ASTEROID SAMPLES TO EARTH

- **Stardust spacecraft (USA)** delivered comet dust samples.
- **Hayabusa2 (Japan)**, only other country to bring back asteroid samples, collected sample from asteroid Ryugu.

## RECOMMENDATIONS ON PROMOTING NETWORKING AND TELECOM EQUIPMENT MANUFACTURING (NATEM) SECTOR RELEASED BY TELECOM REGULATORY AUTHORITY OF INDIA

- **NATEM sector** involves production of various **hardware** for **communication** and data transmission e.g., **routers, modems, Terminals antennas, cables**, etc.
- **Challenges of NATEM sector:**
  - **High cost: upfront payment for imports**, customs duty, etc
  - **Import preference:** toward **established global vendors/Original Equipment Manufacturers**.
  - **Relative cost disadvantages** such as **cost-differentials** vis-a-vis other countries e.g., China, Vietnam.
  - **Supply Chain issues** in terms of **on-demand availability** of supplies for **silicon-based components**.
  - **Market access** in terms of **difficulty** in **accessing telecom networks** for **technology trials**.
- **Key Recommendations:**
  - **Dedicated Telecom Software Development Fund** with an initial corpus of Rs1,000 crore should be established under the **PPP model**.
  - **Concurrent PLI scheme** focussing on components/sub-assembly manufacturing **for collaborated activities**.
  - **Telecom Service Providers** should be **nudged to deploy indigenously manufactured equipment** by reducing their **Applicable Gross Revenues** on an **annual net basis**.
  - **Liberalization of export control regimes**, as a support to exporters of indigenous equipment.
  - **Create a daughter fund** for interest subvention, tax relief for IPR-driven firms, etc.
  - **Develop automation tools** based on **AI/ML (Machine learning)**, etc.
  - **Others:** Skill development, promotion of India as a repair hub, etc.

### NATEM SECTOR IN INDIA

- **India's contribution** to the global telecom equipment market is only **1.4%-1.5%**.
- More than **67% of India's import of telecom equipment** originates from a few East Asian countries.
- **Need:** adoption of **5G, Cloud Computing, Data centers/ Edge Data centers, Geo-navigation techniques** relies on requires Telecom Equipments.

## SUSTAINABILITY-DRIVEN NON-TARIFF MEASURES: ASSESSING RISKS TO INDIA'S FOREIGN TRADE' REPORT RELEASED BY COUNCIL ON ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT AND WATER

- The report seeks to **assess the impact of EU's non-tariff measures (NTMs)** on **India's exports**.
- **NTMs** are policy measures **other than ordinary customs tariffs** that have an economic effect on trade e.g., EU's **Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM)**, United States Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), etc.
- **NTMs are broadly divided into two groups viz:**
  - **Technical Measures**, including regulations, standards, and testing, **Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS)** and **Technical Barriers to Trade (TBT)** measures.
  - **Non-technical measures**, include quantitative restrictions (**quotas, non-automatic import licensing**), and **price measures**.
- **Key findings**
  - India's export of **affected sectors** to the **EU is approximately USD 9.5 billion**, as of 2022.
  - **Products at risk** are **textiles, chemicals, selected consumer electronics products**, etc.
  - Adding **CBAM sectors**, exports of **at-risk sectors** are nearly **43% of India's exports** to the EU as of 2022.
- **Policy recommendations**
  - **Use bilateral free trade agreements (FTAs)** to develop **mutual recognition** of compliance assessment.
  - **Utilise WTO framework** to raise **specific trade concerns (STCs)** with respect to **NTM**.
  - **Develop independent product standards** in line with **National Strategy for Standardization in 2018**.
  - **Strengthen compliance mechanisms** to prepare industry to comply with **NTM regulations**.
  - **Make export firms** aware of such regulations.

# PARLIAMENTARY PANEL ON HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE PRESENTED “IMPLEMENTATION OF PRADHAN MANTRI TB MUKT BHARAT ABHIYAN (PMTBMBA)” REPORT

- Tuberculosis (TB) is **communicable infectious disease caused by bacteria (Mycobacterium tuberculosis)** and it most often **affects the lungs**.
  - As per WHO Global TB report 2022, around **one-quarter of world’s population (~2 billion)** is **latently infected** with TB.
  - **3 in every 1000 people have active TB** in India.
- Pradhan Mantri TB Mukat Bharat Abhiyan (PMTBMBA) **aims to eliminate TB by 2025**, five years ahead of Sustainable Development Goals 2030.
  - Under it, **Ni-kshay Mitra shall provide additional support to all on-treatment TB patients** who have given consent for support in selected health facilities.
- **Key observations**
  - BCG vaccine (Bacille Calmette-Guerin- vaccine for TB) does **not provide adequate protection to adolescents and adults** who are at high Risk of developing TB disease.
  - **De-contamination of biomedical waste** is critical in preventing transmission of TB disease.
  - Ni-Kshay adoption model alone cannot be considered the mainstay of fighting the disease under PMTBMBA.
- **Recommendations**
  - Expediting **research programme to study BCG effectiveness** and consider **booster dose of recombinant BCG vaccine** in universal immunisation programme.
  - **Establish robust selection process for Ni- kshay Mitra** and effective monitoring mechanisms to ensure their diligent fulfillment of responsibilities.

- **NIKSHAY Portal:** National TB information system which acts as **one-stop solution to manage TB patients’ information**.
- **Find. Treat. All. #EndTB:** Joint Initiative of WHO, Stop TB Partnership, and Global Fund to **diagnose treat and report 40 million people with TB**.
- **Moscow Declaration 2017.**
